By endorsing a pluralist platform, we guarantee that our values are represented through the distribution of over \$1 billion annually to support Jewish causes worldwide. Your vote is not simply a choice; it's a powerful tool for change. Many of the 21 slates align with our pluralistic values and reflect our unique perspectives on our investment in the Jewish state. If you care about nurturing a democratic, pluralistic, and secure Israel, your vote is crucial. Discover the slates at www.Zionistelection.org and make your voice heard.

Among the many slates that support progressive Judaism are:

Vote Reform (Slate #3): This platform advocates for a democratic, pluralistic, and vibrant Israeli society and emphasizes funding for Reform synagogues, rabbis, and recognition and support of non-Orthodox Jews, women, and minorities.

Kol Yisrael (Slate #4): Affiliated with StandWithUs and Young Judea, this platform focuses on Israel-Diaspora relations, combating antisemitism, emphasizing pluralism, inclusivity,

and bridging gaps between diverse Jewish communities. Kol Israel is not affiliated with any political party or religious movement.

ANU: A New Union (Slate #6): A new left-wing slate primarily composed of millennial and Gen Z Jews. ANU supports a pluralistic vision for Israel and the Jewish community, emphasizing social justice and inclusivity. Delegates advocate for a two-state solution to the Israeli-Palestinian conflict and the independence of Israeli courts and align with broader left-wing Zionist coalitions globally.

Hatikvah (Slate #16): This slate is abroad coalition of left-wing progressive Zionist groups, including J Street, the New Israel Fund, the National Council of Jewish Women, Ameinu, and T'ruah. It focuses on social justice, peace, and equality. It also supports marginalized communities and advocates for progressive policies in Israel. Hatikvah aims to counter the influence of right-wing and ultra-Orthodox groups within Zionist institutions

Mercaz USA (Slate #17): Mercaz represents Conservative/Masorti Jews and advocates for pluralism and democracy. Its focus is funding Masorti programs, implementing egalitarian prayer spaces, ensuring that the Law of Return is not restricted, and increasing support for marginalized communities.

Dorshei Torah V'Tzion (Slate #18) is a Liberal Orthodox group supported by the Jewish Orthodox Feminist Alliance. It seeks to improve Israel-Diaspora relations, promote religious pluralism, and expand women's equality

in religious settings like yeshivot. The group advocates for a pluralistic Orthodox approach, emphasizing gender equity and inclusivity.

The Jewish Future (Slate #20) advocates for "centrist liberal Zionism," which focuses on strengthening ties between Israel and the Diaspora. This approach emphasizes democratic values, pluralism, and inclusivity and seeks to balance progressive ideals with Zionist principles.

To Vote

Any Jewish adult in the U.S. aged 18 and over can vote online at zionistelection. org for \$5. This is a simple process and a powerful way to make your voice heard. Our vote is our voice, and we must use it to shape the future of Israel and the global Jewish community.

For an in-depth discussion, please join us for dinner at Beth Abraham Synagogue on Tuesday, April 22. The meal will feature Israeli cuisine, and activist Tammy Gottlieb will give a talk. 

Navigating Loss: Dinner with Comfort Foods

What is a Sephardic Passover Seder?

The Jewish diaspora has fostered two major cultural branches—Ashkenazi and Sephardi Jewry—each with unique traditions, languages and cuisines.

Ashkenazi Jews hail from Central and Eastern Europe, including Germany, Poland, and Russia. Sephardi Jews trace their lineage to the Iberian Peninsula before the 1492 expulsion, later settling in North Africa, the Mediterranean, and the Middle East.

Both groups avoid *chametz* (leavened foods) during Passover, but their approaches differ. Ashkenazim prohibit *kitniyot*—rice, legumes, and corn—due to historical concerns about contamination or resemblance to grains. Their Seder features matzah balls, gefilte fish, and brisket, suited to colder climates. Sephardim, however, permit *kitniyot*, enriching their meals with rice, lentils, and chickpeas. Their Seder might include spicy haroset with dates, lamb stews, or rice dishes, reflecting sunnier origins.

This year our Temple Beth Or Passover Community celebration will feature all of our customary rituals —the Haggadah, *matzah*, *maror*, and four cups of wine. Yet, we enhance our celebration with additional Sephardic customs, and our menu will include zestier, Mediterranean notes. (non-*kitniyot* options available).
