

"Judah will Live Forever"



Every Hanukkah, I am reminded of the depiction of a kindled menorah in the window across from Nazi headquarters in Kiel, Germany. It was the final days of 1931, and the Posner family lit their menorah in

Shannekkah

a sign of Jewish courage, defiance, and faith.

Rachel Posner, the wife of Rabbi Dr. Akiva Posner, wrote in German on the back of this picture:



Chanukah 5692 [1931-2]
"Death to Judah" - So the flag says
"Judah will live forever" - So the light answers."

It was weeks before Hitler became chancellor, yet the Nazi party was already circulating anti-Jewish propaganda and stirring antisemitic discontent in German communities. The Posner family wisely observed that it was no longer safe for Jews to live in

Germany. In 1933, they emigrated to the holy land and persuaded many of the Jews of Kiel to join them.

And in the coming decades, Akiva and Rachel Posner's grandchildren continued to light Hanukkah candles on the same menorah with their Israeli grandchildren. On Hanukkah 5770 (2009), their great-grandson, Akiva Mansbach, brought the lamp to his military base and read the following salute to his great-grandparents:

In 5692, the menorah is in exile; it stands in the window

It challenges the party flag that doesn't yet rule

"Judah die!" it says And Grandma's rhyme responds

In its own tongue, without despair:

So the flag says, but our candle answers and declares

"Judah will live forever."

In 5770, the menorah stands in the window once

norah stands in the window once again

Facing the flag of the ruling State The descendant Akiva, named for his great-grandfather

Salutes through the window and lights the menorah

Grandmother, give thanks above and say a prayer

That "the Redeemer will come to Zion" and not delay.

Here we are some 90 years later, and the darkness of bigotry and antisemitism threatens to engulf us again. Thus, we are called upon to observe the rabbinic commandment *pirsum hanes* – to "publicize the miracle" of Hanukkah. The kindling of the Hanukkah lights is a statement of defiance and courage in a world threatening to immerse us in the darkness of hatred. When so many of our children feel compelled to hide their Jewishness on campus, and our Jewish institutions require fences and security guards, we are called upon to stand firm.

Latkes taste wonderful, dreidel games are amusing, and gifts are exciting. But the true commandment of Hanukkah is to make a public statement to our neighborhoods and our community that we affirm light over darkness.

Like the Maccabees of old, we will not discard our Jewish practice to assimilation and secular political pressures. Like the Posner family from Kiel, we will kindle the lamps of Judaism despite social media's antisemitic tropes. Giving our children the gift of Jewish pride and confidence will far outlast any other present we can offer them!

Each Hanukkah, as the descendants of Rachel and Akiva Posner, kindle the Hanukkah lights in their window; they affirm their great-grandmother's powerful words, which have sustained their family and our people forever "Judah (Judaism) will live forever." So may we.

December is a month filled with different occasions for different faiths and communities; there are memorials like Pearl Harbor Re-

membrance Day on December 7th. There are celebrations like Nobel Prize Day, which occurs on December 10th. There are religious and cultural holidays like Hanukkah, Christmas and Kwanzaa, and there are secular holidays like New Year's Day.

Putting many of these holidays together, you get the part of the year sometimes referred to as the giving season. For our students and kids, it jokingly could be called the taking season or the gift-getting season, when gifts seem to flow at many family parties.

We hope each family will take a moment during the eight days leading up to Hanukkah (December 10th through 18th) to put one item in the bag a night. We are calling it the "Eight Days of Giving." Whether it is a set of socks, a toothbrush, a game or a toy, we hope you will fill the bag with things that others in need could use each night. We hope our students will appreciate what it means to give at this time and not just receive.

Then on December 18th, at our community Hanukkah celebration, we invite you to bring your bag filled with things to donate and drop it off at Temple Beth Or and learn about Hannah's Treasurer Chest while enjoying the goodies we will have at the Hanukkah party!

Finally, on January 15th, our *Makor* community will gather at Hannah's Treasure Chest, where we can see firsthand the fantastic work they are doing and help with a volunteer project in the spirit of the Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday weekend.

In the spirit of the season we enter, we look forward to giving just as much as we get, by filling our space with light, warmth and love during this, the season of giving.

Potential Tax Benefits

For Individuals age 70.5 and older you can direct up to \$100,000 per year tax-free from their IRAs to operating charities through Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD). We have seen many congregants use this strategy to satisfy the Required Minimum Distribution (RMD) requirement of their IRA's. This allows taxpayers, itemizers, and non-itemizers alike to direct gifts from their IRA to charities.

Each year the IRS allows individuals who itemize their deductions the ability to include charitable donations. Donations to Temple Beth Or are tax deductible. Even though the IRS has raised the standard deduction in recent years, if you do itemize you can include your donations to Temple Beth Or.

Commemorative Opportunities

Paver Bricks: Paver bricks are a lasting way to commemorate a person or an event. Bricks are available in two sizes and can hold three or five lines of text, respectively. Yahrzeit Plaques: Yahrzeit plaques are available for \$500. Payment for the Plaque includes:

- Name read at Yom Kippur
