

# Nourishing our Bodies, Minds, and Souls in 2023



January is the month when we make resolutions about cutting calories and eating healthily. In his Hebrew language blog, comedian Joel Chasnoff points out that the modern word for "nutrition" in Isra-

el might have much to teach us as we adjust our consumption in the coming calendar year.

Like many people around the world, Israelis are paying close attention to their health, including what they choose to eat. Thus, the word for healthy eating – nutrition – is as common in Israel as it is here in the United States.

Of course, the Hebrew word for diet is not in the Bible. Who in Biblical times had the luxury of watching their calories? Yet the modern Hebrew word for nutrition, *t'zunah*,, comes from a very ancient source.

T'zunah comes from the Hebrew three-letter root zay-in, vav, and nun, which refers to food or sustenance. Our youth who go to camp are familiar with the blessing they sing following a meal, Birchat HaMaZON -the blessing after a meal. And some of us donate to the organization MaZON: A Jewish Response to Hunger which helps those suffering from food insecurity.

The Hebrew t'zunah, takes the root for food and, adds the letter  $taf(\pi)$  to



the beginning and the letter *heh* (a) to the end. As such, it creates a word that expresses the ultimate expression of the word. *T'zunah* isn't just food; it is that which best sustains and fuels our bodies and minds. It is nourishment in its highest form.

As we consider our own consumption for the coming year, we can extend the idea of *tz'unah* beyond caloric intake.

As we face a new secular year, we might consider a resolution about t'zunah; what might we feed our minds and spirits along with our bodies? Do we spend our days doom-scrolling on social media, consuming empty Tik-Tok videos, or listening endlessly to vapid celebrity podcasts? Or we could fill our spare time with books, music, and art which nourish our minds and spark new interests and hobbies. Do we consume the same single news sources

which align with our opinion? Or do we open ourselves to varying perspectives to better understand the "other" side of the argument? Might we allow our media consumption to inform rather than only to affirm that which we stubbornly believe? Do the people in our lives drag us down and encourage our worst behaviors? Or can we make better choices to surround ourselves with those who share our goals and values, nourish our lives, feed our souls, and encourage us to be the best we can be?

We all know that Jewish law emphasizes dietary discipline. Perhaps if we employ the discipline of *t'zunah*, minding the ethics, health, and nourishment of all that we consume, we will have a happier and healthier 2023.

# Friends & Family CPR/First Aid and Stop the Bleed Courses

Temple Beth Or's Adult Education Committee is offering the Friends and Family CPR/First Aid and Stop the Bleed Courses on Sunday, February 19, 2023 from 10 am – 1 pm in Café Or. The courses will be taught by Scott Henry, Washington Township's Fire Department Public Information Officer and CPR/First Aid/Stop the Bleed Instructor. There is NO CHARGE to participants for these courses. You may register for one or both courses.

### Course 1 – Friends and Family CPR/First Aid: 10 am – 12 noon

The American Heart Association's Family & Friends CPR Course teaches the lifesaving skills of Adult Hands-Only CPR, Adult CPR with breaths, Child CPR, Adult and Child AED use, Infant CPR and choking relief for Adults, Children, and Infants. This course is for people who want to learn CPR & First Aid, but who DO NOT need a Certification card for their jobs. This course is ideal for teachers and students, parents, grandparents, babysitters and others, who are interested in learning how to save a life. At the course completion, participants will receive a Certificate of Attendance. The course lasts approximately two hours.

# Course 2 – Stop the Bleed: 12 -1 pm

Stop the Bleed encourages bystanders to become trained, equipped, and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives. No matter how fast professional emergency responders arrive, bystanders will always be first on the scene. Participants will learn multiple ways to control bleeding in an emergency, including applying direct pressure, packing the wound with bleeding control gauze, and applying a tourniquet. This course lasts approximately one hour.
