Temple Beth Or at 40: Reflecting, Celebrating, and Looking Ahead



It is a momentous occasion as Temple Beth Or prepares to mark its 40th anniversary this month. While our founders dedicated years to shaping our synagogue, we officially consider Temple Beth Or's 'birthday'

to be our first *Shabbat* Service on Friday, January 25, 1985.

Just as the ancient Israelites spent forty years in the wilderness forging themselves together as a nation, our past forty years have been formative for us as a Temple family. As we approach 2025, it's a year to not only celebrate our past and cherish our present but also to eagerly anticipate the direction for our future. Here are three events and programs that I would like to highlight this month:

First: Our 40th Anniversary Service will be on Friday night, January 31, at 7:00 p.m. We are blessed to be musically led by Cantor Rosalie Will, the founder of "Sing unto God," an initiative to revitalize Jewish music education. I knew Rosalie as a talented song leader at the Goldman Union Camp Institute (GUCI). Since then, she has become a renowned cantor and lead consultant for the Union for Reform Judaism (URJ) on music and worship.

Rosalie will provide the musical score to our Temple's life story, blending traditional Jewish melodies with contemporary sounds. Our own Temple choir director, Mary 'Mahira' Rogers, has worked with Cantor Will for the past year. They will blend our choir, our

youth musicians, and all our voices to "Sing unto God," giving thanks for our forty years together. There will be a Gala *Oneg Shabbat* to follow this service.

Second: The Jewish camping world also brings us our second special guest for this celebratory weekend. On Saturday, February 1, 6:00 p.m., Levin Hall will be the site of "Who Knows One," a social media game show conceived and hosted by Micah Hart (son of camp director Macy Hart).

WE will be the focus of this game show, which takes its inspiration from Hart's love for Jewish summer camp experiences. It's a modern twist of Jewish geography (Perhaps it will be Six Degrees of founding president Donald Weckstein?), which will trace our deep-rooted connections to one another and uncover unexpected bonds between diverse members of Temple Beth Or. It sounds like an entertaining night, filled with laughter, surprises, and a deeper understanding of our community.

Finally, an ongoing project will occur this year as we examine our Temple's road map and explore your hopes and aspirations for our synagogue as we move forward. Our board has engaged two experienced strategic advisors,



Richard Friedman, and Rachel Berezin, to help us forge a congregational dialogue about how best to navigate the next forty years of our journey together. May our vision be as bold, dynamic, and innovative as that of our founders!

What an exciting year ahead for our Temple family. Recalling our past, celebrating our present, and anticipating the next forty years will make for an inspiring 2025. And don't forget to save this time on your calendar next year (January 2026) for our Ruby Ball, a grand celebration symbolizing our forty years of journey, to culminate our year of celebration.

FROM THE CLASSROOM

It has been a fantastic winter semester of Makor. As students have grown over the months, our community has flourished, and we've gained valuable insights throughout this journey. Here's a glimpse into what's happening in the classroom!



PREK & **KINDERGARDEN**

We have been exploring the Jewish holidays that we have celebrated so far, along with themes of creation, Adam & Eve, and Noah's Ark. Some of our favorite activities include the creation scavenger hunt, where seven bags were hidden around the room for the kids to match with the corresponding creation day. Additionally, the students enjoyed a close-up look at the mini Torah for Simchat Torah.

1ST & 2ND **GRADE**

We've had a great time exploring holidays leading up to Hanukkah! We talked about g'milut chasadim, (acts of kindness) and talked about the differences between mitzvah and tzedakah. We shared stories about Adam & Eve and Noah, We also got involved with fun activities like animal charades, where we thought about how animals would survive on the ark. We acted out scenarios to show kindness, and played a game categorizing actions as mitzvah or tzedakah.

4TH & 5TH GRADE

We have centered our discussions around the question: What is a prophet? No, we're not referring to profit (that has a different spelling). We delve deeply into the traits that define a prophet. Our class emphasized individuals who are prophets who may not have recognized their prophetic roles during their lifetimes. We explored the "most significant" or widely recognized prophets and examined why they are regarded as influential figures. Additionally, we have learned how the actions of these prophets may hold relevance in

6TH-7TH **GRADE**

history of the Holocaust, listening to both live and recorded testimonies from survivors, and watching documentaries on the topic. We are in the process of creating and writing a journal to share their thoughts and emotions about what we have experienced.

THE CHAI SCHOOL

This fall, our High School explored current events through a Jewish lens. We debated Zionism. addressed how to respond to antisemitism in their schools, discussed the Jewish vote, and tackled anti-Israel topics in social unpacked media. We contemporary events like the Amsterdam pogroms and examined Jewish laws on war, selfdefense, abortion, and gender identity. We celebrated Sukkot with a Seder, made mezuzot, and baked challah. This is our students first "adult" look at their Jewish practice, and we hope it inspires them to live Jewishly as they prepare to leave home and hearth.

In Preschool and Kindergarten, we have been exploring holidays, the

Our class has been concentrating on the liturgy of the Shabbat morning service. We've dedicated time to mastering the Hebrew alphabet, vowels, and frequently used words. We are actively engaged in reading prayers such as Yotzeir Or and Magriv Argvim. We focus on the chanting of the Amidah, along with the Torah and Haftarah blessings, and are advancing nicely. We should all take pride in our students' achievements

concept of creation, and crafting using mosaic tiles. In First and Second grades, we focused on holidays and using mosaic tiles to make artwork. Upon our return, we will complete our tiles and continue our studies on holidays, mitzvahs, and biblical stories.
