"Etched in Stone, Written in Tears: A Legacy of Survival"



The bas-relief you see here is an ancient, remote image, yet it strikes a chord far too familiar to the Jewish soul. Carved nearly 3,000 years ago into the palace walls of Nineveh,

it celebrates the Assyrian conquest of Israel—the fall of Lachish, a city just 45 miles from Kibbutz Nir Oz. In this stone tableau, a Jewish woman is led into captivity, her two small children clinging to her, their figures frozen in a moment of terror and despair. The Assyrians boasted of their triumph through this art, preserving their cruelty for posterity.

Fast forward to October 7, 2023, and the world witnessed a haunting echo: Shiri Bibas, a 32-year-old mother from Nir Oz, clutching her sons—Ariel, age four, and Kfir, just nine months—as Hamas terrorists abducted them. Hamas, too, boasted, not with chisels on stone but with videos online, flaunting their savagery for all to see.

What became of those children from Lachish? What became of Ariel and Kfir? We know, and it is too horrible to detail here. The bodies of Shiri, Ariel, and Kfir were returned to Israel in February 2025, alongside peace activist Oded Lifshitz, after months of false claims from their captors. Forensic evidence showed they were deliberately murdered, not killed in airstrikes. Our



people are shattered, our hearts broken together. The ancient mother of Lachish and Shiri of Nir Oz share a story of captivity and loss, their children's fates a wound that spans millennia.

Yet amid this darkness, we know one thing. Just as the Assyrian reliefs now sit in museums, one day Jewish children will stand before images of this tragedy and ask, "Who are these men?" We will answer, "They were Hamas, and they tried to destroy the Jewish people." The children will ask, "What happened to them?" And we will say, "The same thing that happened to everyone who tried to destroy us—they failed, and we survived." God avenged those beautiful babies—Ariel, Kfir, and the nameless children of Lachish. Their captors disappeared into history, but we are still here.

Israeli speaker and advocate Hillel Fuld reminds us we've walked this path before. Recall the Jews of Purim, facing annihilation under Haman's decree—zero hope. Or Hanukah, outnumbered by the Seleucid empire—done, gone. Or Passover, 210 years of



slavery under Egypt's iron fist, chased to the sea with no escape. Each time, despair swallowed us whole. Yet today, we celebrate Purim with joy, Hanukah with light, and Passover with freedom. It's impossible now to imagine celebrating Simchat Torah again, but we've been in darker times. We didn't just survive, we flourished, while evil empires crumbled into dust.

The Assyrians carved their victory in stone; Hamas broadcast theirs online. Both are relics of a hatred that cannot win. One day, our children will point to these images in a museum—not of defeat, but of endurance—and we will tell them: "They tried to destroy us, but we thrived. Their memories live in us, and we are still here."

May we yet see *Shalom*, Rabbi Judy Chessin

Navigating Loss: Dinner with Comfort Foods


Thursday, March 20th: 6:00 p.m. to 7:00 p.m.
