"The Pain we feel is Peoplehood."



Our Jewish spring holidays have had a different flavor this year. The October 7 Hamas attack on Israel added an edge to Purim's frivolity over the defeat of Haman, but not Hamas. The dipping of greens in

our Passover tears seemed saltier as we wept for the fate of Israel's hostages. Our mourning for Yom HaShoah's victims is more profound as we bear witness to this year's murder, kidnapping and rape of Israeli victims only because they were Jewish. Israel's 76th birthday, Yom Ha'atzmaut, is bittersweet since we fear for the survival of the Jewish state as it fights this multiple-front war of self-defense.

And yet, for all our anxiety, something is ennobling in our pain. In an essay in Sapir Journal, Mijal Bitton, co-founder of the Downtown Minyan of New York City and fellow at the Shalom Hartman Institute, teaches that "the pain we feel is peoplehood." Peoplehood roots us to time and place. It gives us a past, and a future and it is one of the notable gifts of being Jewish.

According to a midrash (a Jewish legend), a two-headed man lived during King Solomon's reign. He sired six one-headed sons and one two-headed son. When the father died, the two-headed son demanded a double portion of the inheritance. This was a dilemma, for it raised the question as to whether



the two-headed man was two people or one? King Solomon solved the problem this way. He poured boiling water on only one of the heads of the two-headed son. "Ouch!" both heads cried out in pain. And the King proclaimed, "When one head is injured, the other feels pain. Thus, this is one soul and will receive only one inheritance.

Our commentators have suggested that like that two-headed man all Jews are "*Am echad b'lev echad*," one people with one heart. For no matter how varied are our countries of origin, languages, customs, races, or levels of observance, we are yet one people. Like the two-headed man, when one Jew is hurt, we all feel the pain. When our brothers and sisters are attacked in Israel, their pain is ours. And we must respond.

The great teacher Maimonides taught that when a person seeks to join the Jewish people through gerut (conversion), we ask them, "Don't you know that in the present era, the Jews are afflicted, crushed, subjugated, strained, and suffering comes upon them?" If they answer that they know this and still want

to become Jewish, they are accepted with open arms. Jewish existence is acceptance of the "honey and the sting" of peoplehood and its ensuing moral obligations.

Our Israeli brothers and sisters are in proverbial "hot water," and we feel the burn. Therefore, we must channel that pain into committed acts on their and our behalf by donating, praying for the hostages, advocating for their return, fighting social media distortions and half-truths, and lobbying for America's unwavering support for the only democracy in the Middle East.

Rabbi Jonathan Sacks once wrote that Jews are not a collection of "I's" but a single 'We' proud of our collective heritage and prayerful that these terrible events can move Israel into a better future once and for all.

Please join us in our discussion about the current events in Israel and how we can respond on Sunday, May 19, 10 noon in Levin Hall. Shalom.

Half a year after the October 7 attack on Israel, we have been challenged with difficult questions and moral dilemmas. A biased media, fluctuations in US policy, and world-wide increasing antisemitism leave us with few places to find moral clarity.

To help us navigate our way, Richard Friedman, Ehud Borovoy, and Rabbi Judy Chessin will lead a discussion on how to respond to our colleagues, classmates, children, and social media critics with regard to Israel's fivefront war since the catastrophic October 7 Hamas attack on Israel.

Join us on Sunday, May 19, at 10:00 am in Levin Hall for a Zoom and live discussion, including coffee, bagels, and light Israeli snacks. This program

is for teens, adults, Jews and non-Jews and anyone interested in discussing this timely troubling topic.

Richard Friedman, joining us on Zoom, is the former

executive director of the Birmingham Jewish Federation of Alabama. He is also a journalist and associate editor of Southern Jewish Life and InSight magazines and a consultant for David Valinsky Associates, an Ohio-based fundraising and nonprofit consulting firm.

Richard has dedicated his life's work these past six months, advocating for moral clarity in churches, national Jewish Federations and organizations, and non-Jewish political city, state, and national civic organizations and chambers of congress.

Ehud Borovoy is a local Krav Maga instructor, a group/ personal fitness trainer, and a safety and self-defense instructor from Israel. He was born and raised in Israel, serving as a fitness instructor in the IDF (Israel Defense Forces). Following his military service, Ehud became a fitness instructor for the Israel Police Academy, where he trained cadets to pass their fitness exams for eight years. Ehud has lived in Dayton since 2007, where he has become our go-to expert on everything Israel.

Rabbi Judy Chessin, of Dayton's Temple Beth Or will moderate. Among her greatest achievements is the 2 grandsons she and Richard Friedman shares.
