There is nothing as whole as a broken heart."



The events of this past month have broken our hearts. October 7, On 2023, Jewish history changed for all time. The atrocities, murders, torture, and kidnap of our brothers and sisters in the land

of Israel will impact world Jewry forever.

Our hearts are broken as we mourn the loss of innocent Israelis and other nationalities who were tortured, mutilated, raped and then inhumanely slaughtered.

We can't bring ourselves to look at gruesome pictures of the torture, beheading, and burning these innocents endured, and we are heartsick that we live in a society in which Israel has to release such images to bear witness against the distorters of fact and truth deniers.

We are heavy-hearted over the more than 200 hostages, including babies, children, seniors, and holocaust survivors who are held somewhere in Gaza as human shields and political pawns.

We are sick at heart over the injured and orphaned and those traumatized families running endlessly to saferooms to shelter from incoming rockets. We lament the plight of the brave soldiers of IDF who risk their lives daily to fight as "just" a war as possible.

We take to heart the suffering of the innocent civilians in Gaza for what Hamas has brought down upon them. They, too, are the victims, pawns on the international game board of diplomacy used to garner worldwide sympathy by terrorist organizations whose leadership hides in safe opulence in neighboring nations.

We are heartsick that Israel will now have to finish off a very long and drawnout war, one for which the media, the UN, and the world will have limited patience. For all their talk of support today, international leaders are already encouraging Israel to seek a ceasefire.

Yes, our hearts are broken, but as Rabbi Menachem Mendel of Kotzk said,

"There is nothing as whole as a broken heart." And so, just as Israel has not given up, neither will we. We will hold on to our grief, even as we live our Jewish lives boldly and fully, for to live as a proud Jew is an act of resistance.

Now more than ever, we must send our children to Makor to develop pride in their faith and learn about the over 4,000-year-old Jewish claim to the Holy Land. How about, during this war, we begin to light candles on *Shabbat*, even if we've never done it before?

Even if you have to do it at an unconventional time, and let's add a third candle for the people in Israel to bring a bit more light into this dark world.

We can **Educate**, for we may be the only ambassadors and educators our classmates, neighbors, and friends know. They too often believe the loudest voices on the internet and learn their history on TikTok.

We can **Donate**: There are countless places to contribute, whether through Magan David Edom for ambulances <afmda.org/>; Israel on Campus Coalition <israelcc.org > to support beleaguered Jewish students; or United *Hatzalah* <israelrescue.org> to support volunteers who are treating the wounded.

Perhaps the most effective is contrib-



uting to the Jewish Federation's Nationwide Emergency Fund <Jewishfed. org/2023-Israel-emergency-fund-donation>.

Finally, we can Advocate. Let's urge elected officials to stand with Israel, thank them for their support, and repost their encouraging social media messages. We can write letters to the editor or call out irresponsible media coverage of the war in Israel, report disinformation on social media platforms, and stand up against hate crimes against Jews and Muslims.

Our hearts might be broken at the prospect of a bloody and drawn-out war. But such pain makes us human. When we are broken, we enter a universe where we are made whole by our efforts to repair ourselves and the world.

The Complexities of War



Israel once again grappling with the realities of war. The people of Gaza are once again struggling

with an oppressive terrorist organization in Hamas, which rules over them. Our hearts go out to the brave men and women in the Israel Defense Forces who are risking their lives for the safety the land of Israel and the people of Gaza who are victims themselves of Hamas. We are also deeply concerned for our brothers and sisters in the southern and central communities of Israel and cities who have borne the brunt of terrorist acts.

During these tough days, parents and families can be faced with difficult questions from children. Questions about war and violence can be challenging to navigate. Our children look to us for guidance and it is our duty to provide them with comfort, understanding, and accurate, age-appropriate information. Some tips for navigating these difficult conversations:

Age-Appropriate Discussions:

When discussing the situation in Israel and the hostage situation in Gaza with children, it is important to tailor conversations to age and maturity level. Younger children may not be ready for detailed discussions and but rather they are seeking confirmation that they themselves are safe in their home.

Create a Safe Space:

It is important to create a safe space where children feel comfortable expressing thoughts and emotions. Encourage kids to ask questions and share feelings. Be patient and understanding, and avoid dismissing concerns.

Balanced Information:

Provide information that is appropriate for their age. Explain the



situation in simple terms and avoid sharing graphic details. Emphasize that Israel is working towards peace and safety for all peoples.

Be Honest and Reassuring:

It's crucial to be honest with children, but also reassure them that there are many people, including our leaders, working to bring peace to the region.

Highlight Acts of Kindness:

Share stories of kindness and unity within Israel and from the international community. This can help children see that even in difficult times, there is hope and goodness.

Use Spiritual Resources:

Encourage your children to pray for peace, not just for Israel but for the whole world. Discuss the importance of unity and love.

As we address these issues with our children, we should also take care of our own emotional well-being. The stress of war and uncertainty can take a toll on all of us.

In addition to these suggestions, I would like to highlight several resources available to you. There are various organizations and professionals who specialize in helping families and children during times of crisis. They offer guidance, counseling, and educational materials that can be of great help. Some of these resources include:

November 12th: A Day in the Life of a Jewish Verse

Jewish law (*halacha*) determines the Jewish position on any topic. But can the 5 Books of Moses provide clear direction in troubling contemporary dilemmas such as abortion? The term "*Halakhah*" is translated as "Jewish Law," although a more literal translation is "the path that one walks." Led by Rabbi Judy Chessin, *A Day in the Life of a Jewish Verse* will trace the *halachic* journey of one Hebrew verse on fetal life through its long, mean-dering path from the Torah to contemporary conclusions. Learners will both survey the expanse of centuries of Jewish legal literature and generational dialogue and will explore Jewish legal views of abortion.

November 13th: Discovering Ripley, Ohio Tales of Bravery and Empowerment from the Underground Railroad

Join Temple Beth Or Adult Ed on a field trip to beautiful Ripley, Ohio, a village of 1,500 on the Ohio River 60 miles east of the Cincinnati. There we will have guided tours of both the abolitionist John Rankin's House— a National Historic Landmark that USA Today picked as Ohio's "hidden gem"—and the house of John Parker, a former enslaved man who risked himself and his family repeatedly to help others escape. Our guides to the village will be Betty Campbell, a Ripley local who has studied and cherished her town's stories for years, and Mary Ann Olding, an architectural historian who has researched Ripley and who mesmerized the Adult Ed group visiting the Freedom Center in Cincinnati in July, 2023.
