"She's Everything and She's Everywhere"



The tagline for this summer's blockbuster Barbie movie claims, "She's everything, and she's everywhere."

And as we've long speculated, she is Jewish.

Barbie's heritage has been attributed to her Jewish inventor Ruth Handler. Ruth was the 10th child of Polish-Jewish immigrants who never spoke English. Raised by her eldest sister, Ruth married her childhood sweetheart Elliot Handler, and together they founded the Mattel Toy Company in a friend's garage in 1944.

Handler noticed that the only dolls produced in the 1940s were baby dolls. Ruth realized that little girls wanted to play at being big girls, so she tried to get toy designers to create a model of a doll that girls would like to grow to become. The exclusively male toy executives refused, saying mothers would NEVER buy their daughters dolls with breasts!

On a European trip, Ruth found the perfect prototype – a European "adult" doll named "Lili" modeled after a cartoon character in a German tabloid newspaper. Ruth brought the doll back to America, and Lili became the model for Barbara Millicent Roberts. Barbie was released on March 9, 1959.

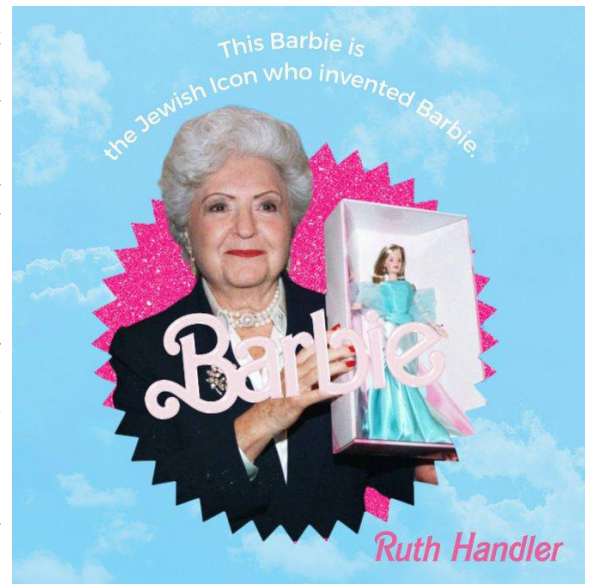
"My whole philosophy of Barbie was that through the doll, the little girl could be anything she wanted to be," said Handler. "Barbie always represented the fact that a woman has choices." Originally, Barbie was a

teen fashion model. Her outfits included "Friday Night Date" and "Sorority Meeting." Later Barbie sported a Jacqueline Kennedy bob, and during the civil rights movement, Mattel created Barbie's first black friend named "Colored Francie." By the 1970s, as feminists criticized Barbie's disproportionate figure, the doll's anatomy changed, as did her career choices. Nurse Barbie became Surgeon Barbie in 1973. She swept the Olympics games in skating, skiing, and gymnastics in 1975. Barbie joined the army and ran for President in 1992! Today's doll line boasts 176 dolls with nine body types, 35 skin tones, and 94 hairstyles. Other recent additions include Barbies wearing hijabs, dolls with prosthetic limbs, hearing impairments, and bald heads.

While to many, the original Barbie symbolizes an Anglo-Saxon woman with blonde hair and an unattainable figure, others have seen her as a Jewish icon, and the doll has even been a target of antisemitism.

In 2003, Saudi Arabia outlawed the sale of Barbie dolls. The state's religious police wrote: "Jewish Barbie dolls, with their revealing clothes and shameful postures, accessories, and tools, are a symbol of decadence to the perverted West. Let us beware of her dangers and be careful."

Even the cast of the Barbie movie includes some MOT (members of the tribe). British Jewish actor Kingsley Ben-Adir will play a Ken doll. Kingsley adopted the Hebrew name



Ben-Adir (son of the mighty) when he, his mother, and his brother converted to Judaism. Ariana Greenblatt will play a human named Sasha. Her Jewish heritage comes from her father's side, while her mother is Puerto Rican. Ana Cruz Kayne plays a Jewish Supreme Court Justice Barbie in the image of Ruth Bader Ginsberg, and Hari Nef plays Dr. Barbie. She was born to a Jewish family in Philadelphia. Nef is an actor, writer, and activist and the first trans model to be signed by IMG Models.

So while Barbie, may not be explicitly Jewish, you can order a Barbie *Shabbat* set and Jewish-themed clothes and accessories on Etsy. And if you stretch it, you can claim that seeing the movie is a Jewish experience, as well!

We look forward to seeing everyone on August 27, when we will be having a drop-in, welcome back brunch, song-session, and activities along with the opportunity to register for anyone who might still need to. Salvador Dali: A Look at Some of His Jewish-Themed Works -- Can we separate the man from the art?

Dali is known for his works with their detailed, dream-like imagery. With the rise of anti-Semitism in the 1930s, the artist painted several works which show interest in Hitler. He was exiled from the Surrealists for his flirtation with Nazism. Decades later, he was selected by the State of Israel to create works for its twentieth anniversary. His works for this celebratory event are striking in their treatment of Biblical and contemporary history. Also, Dali admired Freud and met him in London where the artist painted a portrait of this intellectual giant. He also created *Famous Men*, a series of lithographs. The series included portraits of Moshe Dayan, Freud, Einstein, Ben Gurion, and JFK.

This talk raises the question of how to evaluate his radiant Jewish-themed works and his feelings about Jews.

Friends and Family CPR and Stop the Bleed Courses



SAVE A LIFE

Sunday, August 27th, 9 a.m.–12 p.m. in Levin Hall

The Adult Education Committee is pleased to offer the Friends and Family CPR/Choking/First Aid and Stop the Bleed Courses. The courses will be taught by Scott Henry, Washington Township's Fire Department Public Information Officer and CPR/First Aid/Stop the Bleed Instructor. These courses are being offered at NO CHARGE to participants.

The American Heart Association's Family & Friends CPR Course teaches the lifesaving skills of Adult hands-Only CPR, Adult CPR with breaths, Child CPR, Adult and Child AED use, Infant CPR and choking relief for Adults, Children, and Infants. Basic First Aid will also be included. This course lasts approximately two hours.

The CPR/Choking/First Aid course is designed for people who want to learn CPR, but DO NOT need a course completion card in CPR for their job. This course is ideal for schools and students, parents, grandparents, babysitters and others interested in learning how to save a life.

The Stop the Bleed course lasts approximately one hour and is a grassroots national awareness campaign and call-to-action. Stop the Bleed encourages bystanders to become trained, equipped, and empowered to help in a bleeding emergency before professional help arrives.

No matter how fast professional emergency responders arrive, bystanders will always be first on the scene.



A person who is bleeding can die from blood loss within five minutes, therefore it is critical to quickly stop the blood loss. Participants will learn multiple ways to control bleeding in an emergency, including applying direct pressure, packing the wound with bleeding control gauze and applying a tourniquet.
